

Locum letter 8th April 2018.

Christ is Risen Alleluia Alleluia. He is Risen indeed Alleluia Alleluia

Throughout the Easter season, our first readings will come from the Acts of the Apostles. Today we start with a snapshot of the early Christian community in Jerusalem. Luke whom we believe wrote the book gives us an idyllic picture of a harmonious, faithful and prayerful community. In other parts of the book there are suggestions that this was not always the case and indeed in Paul's letters we have recorded accounts that there were serious problems in many of the communities he had founded. Parish communities and Dioceses for that matter strive for the ideal but sadly, as we know this is not always the case. However much the realty of harmony falls short from the picture Luke puts before us, his ideal should always remain paramount.

In today's Gospel from John we read of the giving of the spirit and the commissioning of the disciples in the one account. By contrast Luke introduces a time span of 40 days before Jesus ascends and 50 days before the outpouring of the spirit. It is Luke's account that provides the framework for the Church's liturgical calendar. Each is telling the same story in a different theological framework. It is peace and of resurrection hope.

Our Easter celebrations continue for the next 50 days, and of course everyday of the year. Resurrection and new life is the centre of our faith and discipleship. We are called to share the Good news of Hope in word and action confident of God's faithfulness.

Today we welcome and will hear from the Revd. Bob Mitchell. He is currently the CEO of Anglican Overseas Aid and an Anglican priest. Bob has extensive experience in international aid and development and is passionate about what Anglicans can do to assist those elsewhere to reach their human potential. Anglican Overseas Aid began as Melbourne's Archbishop's International aid agency and is now widely supported across the country. I am privileged to be a member. We will take a retiring offering for this work today.

Finally let me thank everyone who helped in different ways to make our Holy week and Easter celebrations one of joy and hope.

Ray Shalom Anglicare and St Mark's Fitzroy food basket is another way this Lent to share with others the bounty of our community.



A reading from the book of Acts

Acts 4.32-37

Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need. There was a Levite, a native of Cyprus, Joseph, to whom the apostles gave the name Barnabas (which means 'son of encouragement'). A Reading from the first book of John

1 John 1.1 - 2.2

We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life— this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us— we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete. This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us. My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world. Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

John 20.19-31

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to

them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.' But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.' A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then he said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe.' Thomas answered him, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.' Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.
