

From our Locum 24th June 2018

Fear is the theme of two of our readings today – the disciples were afraid of the storm (Jesus stills the storm - Mark 4:35-41) and in the Old Testament reading Saul is afraid (or jealous) of David and throws his spear at him. All of us have fears of one kind or another and it is important to express our fears whether to a person whom you can trust, your partner or parish priest. In both the Old and New Testament's the word 'fear' is often used to express a person's feelings about being in the presence of the 'Holy' or the 'Other' – God. This word used in the original language really means awe and wonder – an antidote to the attitude of taking everything for granted – so it is important to express our awe and wonder at what God is doing in our lives and in this place.

We are told that David played his harp for Saul and soothed and healed his moods. It is well known that music can have this effect – not just Christian music but music of all kinds. We are very fortunate at St George's to have a beautiful pipe organ and our wonderful choir led by such capable organists. Next time you need a lift, listen to music – it is good for the soul.

A little story that might amuse you. In my first parish at Holbrook NSW there was a little country church at a place called Cookardinia, on the road to Wagga Wagga. You had to drive through a paddock from the road to reach the Church which also had a cemetery behind – blink and you missed it. Not much else existed in Cookardinia apart from the small school, a hall and tennis courts but

a great community spirit existed amongst the farming community. It even had a football team - Mangoplah Cookardinia United. One of my tasks was to visit the one teacher school regularly and teach Religious Instruction to the 12-14 pupils. I would often go and play games — tennis or ball games with the students and after lunch my lesson would begin. This particular day it was very hot and all the doors and windows were left open. I began by talking about our feelings. The word 'fear' was mentioned and as I was speaking, 2 rather large hornets flew into the classroom and came straight towards me. I was dumb struck and the pupils actually had a real life example of what fear was — the visiting priest was afraid of hornets! The students thought it hilarious and luckily for me the hornets turned and left the room at the noise of the loud laughter. Fear is definitely part of being human!


A reading from 1 Samuel

1 Samuel 17.57-18:5

On David's return from killing the Philistine, Abner took him and brought him before Saul, with the head of the Philistine in his hand. Saul said to him, 'Whose son are you, young man?' And David answered, 'I am the son of your servant Jesse the Bethlehemite.' When David had finished speaking to Saul, the soul of Jonathan was bound to the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul. Saul took him that day and would not let him return to his father's house. Then Jonathan made a covenant with David, because he loved him as his own soul. Jonathan stripped himself of the robe that he was wearing, and gave it to David, and his armour, and even his sword and his bow and his belt. David went out and was successful wherever Saul sent him; as a result, Saul set him over the army. And all the people, even the servants of Saul, approved. The next day an evil spirit from God rushed upon Saul, and he raved within his house, while David was playing the lyre, as he did day by day. Saul had his spear in his hand; and Saul threw the spear, for he thought, 'I will pin David to the wall.' But David eluded him twice. Saul was afraid of David, because the Lord was with him but had departed from Saul. So Saul removed him from his presence, and made him a commander of a thousand; and David marched out and came in, leading the army. David had success in all his undertakings; for the Lord was with him. When Saul saw that he had great success, he stood in awe of him. But all Israel and Judah loved David; for it was he who marched out and came in leading them.

A Reading from 2 Corinthians

2 Corinthians 6.1-13

As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,

'At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you.'

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labours, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honour and dishonour, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. In return—I speak as to children—open wide your hearts also.

James Edmeston (10 September 1791 – 7 January 1867) was an English architect and surveyor, he was also known as a prolific writer of church hymns. He was born in Wapping, Middlesex, England. His maternal grandfather was the Reverend Samuel Brewer, congregation.

Edmeston began as an architect in 1816. He designed several structures in London, including drinking fountains and St Paul's, Onslow Square. George Gilbert Scott was his pupil, articled to Edmeston in 1827. In 1864 he

built Columbia Wharf, Rotherhithe, the first grain silo in a British port. Edmeston started by writing poetry publishing *The Search, and other Poems* in 1817.

He served as the church warden at St. Barnabas in Homerton, Middlesex, and was a strong supporter of and frequent visitor to the London Orphan Asylum. Edmeston is said to have written 2000 hymns, one every Sunday. His best-known hymn is the popular wedding hymn 'Lead us, Heavenly Father, lead us / O'er the world's tempestuous sea'.

He died in Homerton in 1867.
